Located in the Heping District of Taichung City of Taiwan, Heping Junior High School is an unique institution that offers Indigenous and Taiwanese students a distinctive Atyal cultural education with a total of 41 students and staff members.

Despite its remote location, the school recently welcomed a group of 21 students and teachers from Kambala School for a six-day visit, commencing on the 30th of September. Kambala School, an independent school in New South Wales, Australia, is exclusively for girls up to 18 years old.

Since 2021, through the efforts of the Education Division of TECO in Australia, Heping Junior High School has been engaging in online school companionship activities with Kambala School. These interactions involve language exchanges and sharing about campus life and Indigenous culture.

To host Kambala School's visit, 14 students were chosen to represent Heping Junior High School and engage in face-to-face visits with their counterparts.

Heping Junior High School extended a warm welcome to Kambala, providing them with a unique cultural experience. Additionally, Kambala's team had the chance to immerse themselves in the native and urban environment of Taichung City, creating immersing educational opportunities and building strong relationships that will encourage future exchanges between the two sister schools.

Heping's teachers organised a variety of cultural experiences for the visiting students. These included outings to the Green Sky Corridor at Taichung Railway Station, the Bureau of Cultural Heritage of the Ministry of Culture, Zhongxiao Night Market, the National Museum of Natural Science, and the Powerhouse of the Semiconductor Industry.

Kambala's students also had the opportunity to attend classes at Heping Junior High School, where they participated in Atayal cultural courses such as weaving, farming, music, and dance, as well as tribal exploration. Through these experiences, students gained insight into the wisdom of natural life in the Heping District.

On the first day of Kambala's itinerary, Heping's students joined with nineteen Australian students to prepare a welcoming snack.

Together, they cooked glutinous rice to prepare banana-leaf-wrap rice and pounded mochi.

Donning traditional Atayal costumes, mainly in red, the students symbolised the positivity, enterprising spirit, and vitality of the Atayal people. They also blessed the Australian students and taught them the Atayal dance. This allowed the students to learn about the Atayal traditional society of "men hunting and women weaving" and appreciate their ancestors' wisdom.

Eason Gao, a student from Heping Junior High School, impressed the visitors with his performance during the Atayal welcome dance. While carrying two heavy logs of wood, he embodied the spirit of Atayal men working hard to provide for their families in the mountains and forests.

Eason expressed his joy in sharing local cultural performances with Australian students. The pounding mochi welcome ritual was particularly memorable as it provided an excellent opportunity for cultural exchange. These experiences fostered cultural literacy and encouraged communication among students from both schools.

Kambala's group was formed by its Year 9 and 10 students on a Mandarin elective. Led by Mandarin teacher Mrs. Sam Chen Yang, the students gained valuable cultural exposure and formed lasting bonds with their Taiwan sister schools' counterparts.

Below is a reflection from Kambala Year 9 student Zoe.

"Throughout this trip, we truly fostered all of our school values despite being so far from home. For all of us, huge courage was shown in meeting new people, being highly independent in an unfamiliar environment and taking on new experiences one after another.

Curiosity was constantly satisfied through the wealth of new information that we acquired - whether that was in the form of learning about the lifestyle of the Indigenous peoples of Taiwan, completing the daunting task of navigating Taiwan's complex MRT (transport) system, or simply learning Mandarin colloquialisms appropriate to the conversations of teenage girls.

Humanity and respect were at the forefront of everything we encountered during our weeks away - learning to appreciate a different way of life, taking part in cultural practices from dancing, to cooking, to weaving, and celebrating the heritage and language we had the privilege to immerse ourselves in."

TAIWAN-ANU JOINT PHD SCHOLARSHIP FOR 2024 NOW ACCEPTING APPLICATIONS

The Ministry of Education (MOE) in Taiwan provides scholarships for students to pursue Ph.D. studies at top 100 universities worldwide, including the University of Sydney, Australian National University, Cambridge, Caltech, and UC Berkeley. These programs offer joint funding and the opportunity for Taiwanese students to gain international experience.

This month, we are excited to highlight two scholarship programs in the Southern Hemisphere, jointly funded by MOE and two highly regarded Australian universities - the University of Sydney and The Australian National University (ANU).

ANU is a world-leading university located in Australian Capital, which focuses on excellence in research and education ensuring its graduates are in demand worldwide.

In 2023, the Ministry of Education of Taiwan renewed an agreement with ANU to continue the Taiwan - Australian National University Scholarship until 2028.

Taiwan-ANU joint Ph.D. scholarship program commenced in 2013 and provides tuition fees and stipends for up to 5 Taiwanese students per year to undertake Ph.D. studies at ANU over the course of the five year agreement.

Eligible Program/ Field of Study

Doctor of Philosophy (PHD); All areas except for professional doctorates. Study must be commenced between 1 May 2024 and 31 August 2024.

Who can apply

Scholarship is awarded on the condition that the scholar is a citizen of Taiwan (R.O.C.) who is admitted to and continues to pursue a full-time program for the degree of Doctor of Philosophy at The Australian National University. Applicants should normally be resident in Taiwan, Penghu, Kinmen, and Ma Tsu, although those currently residing outside Taiwan are not excluded.

How to apply

- Applicants should submit a separate scholarship application to ANU and MOE.
- Prospective applicants must first apply for admission to ANU for their Ph.D. program before 30 November 2023. Only those have received a subsequent offer of admission to ANU will be considered for the scholarship.
- Applicants should submit a separate scholarship application to MOE between 13 November to 7 December 2023.

TECO IN AUSTRALIA

The Ministry of Education (MOE), Taiwan and the University of Sydney (USyd) jointly fund up to 5 Ph.D. scholarships each year since 2020.

The Taiwan-University of Sydney Joint PhD Scholarship program provides tuition fees and stipends/ living cost for recipients to undertake Ph.D. studies at USyd for a period of three years and six months and a possible extension of maximum of six months.

The University of Sydney is a world-leading university in Australia's populous city, Sydney, which focuses on excellence in research and education ensuring its graduates are in demand worldwide.

Eligible Program/ Field of Study

Doctor of Philosophy (PHD); All areas except for professional doctorates.

Successful awardees

In 2022, this prestigious scholarship has been awarded to a diverse group of Taiwanese students, including a former palliative care nurse, a marine biologist and rescue diver, and a pharmacist-turned-sociologist, all of whom are undertaking their studies at USyd.

Who can apply

You must:

- be a citizen of Taiwan (R.O.C.)
- be a prospective student (not yet commenced at the University)
- have applied for admission in a PhD at the University by 30 November 2023.

How to apply

- You must first apply for admission to the USyd in your preferred PhD program by 30 November 2023 at 11.59pm (AEST).
- Then you are required to apply through the MOE by 7 December 2023.

Note: Applicants do not have to have received an offer of admission to submit a scholarship application to the MOE. However, only applicants who have received a subsequent offer of admission to the University of Sydney will be considered for the final award of the scholarship.

Generally, the Doctor of Philosophy (Ph.D.) requires a minimum IELTS result of 6.5 overall and a result of 6 in each band. Please check your course page for each faculty requirement.
