INTENSIVE CHINESE NETWORK (ICN) WORKSHOP

The Intensive Chinese Network (ICN) is an informal network of Australian schools committed to teaching Chinese through Content and Language Integrated Learning (CLIL). This means in addition to a dedicated Chinese class, at least 30% of the curriculum is taught in Chinese. This way of teaching Mandarin provides students a more authentic and meaningful foreign language learning experience.

On August 30, ICN held an interactive workshop in Victoria sponsored by the Taiwan Mandarin Education Resources Center. The workshop fostered a shared identity between ICN schools and provided a platform for their experiences and expertise.

The workshop gathered over 50 attendants from a variety of backgrounds to participate in a range of speeches, learning observations and a hands-on workshop. A keynote presentation was given by Dr Russell Cross on trying to find a balance between content and language. A guest speech was delivered by Kris Sapoeira who covered integrating arts and languages through CLIL. Between speeches, participants took part in class observations which were split into a 'literacy' and 'content subject' focus. Following, participants took part in a 'hands-on' workshop to explore Simple Accounts, the rationale behind linguistic choices and selecting specific language elements over others.

Overall, the workshop's dynamic program of theoretical and hands on activities made for a rich learning experience amongst participants, able to uptake and apply new knowledge all in the one workshop.
